Dear Members and Friends,

Elephant continues to receive encouragement; readers expressed their moral support, willingness to assist with office work, and their wish to assist the EIG financially. A number of readers have been generous and donated well above the requested subscription fees. Those individuals and institutions were sent a special acknowledgment for their generosity. A financial report and pertinent acknowledgments are included in this issue. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who helped, financially or otherwise. Without their support this issue would have been delayed even further.

Daniel J. Graf, Acting Director, Office of Research and Sponsored Programs Services of Wayne State University (WSU), has helped tremendously. John D. Taylor, Chairman, Department of Biology, WSU, has told us that the Department would continue to help whenever necessary, but added, "Try to be independent." Actual assistance and offers to help are also being made by different members in or outside the Detroit area. In particular, William Prychodko, Mary Jo Szuba, Sherri DeFauw, John McKinney, and Joseph Engelhard are acknowledged for their useful comments. During the past summer, I travelled to Africa in connection with my research in mammalian phylogeny, and learned firsthand of the acceptance has received. Also there were comments that more residents and citizens of Africa and Asia should be aware of and be members of the Elephant Interest Group if it is to achieve its goals. The idea concerning the need to have more EIG members from the above continents is not new to us.
