ON THE CONTRIBUTORS

C. R. Ananthasubramanian: Has carried out a series of systematic investigations on various aspects of fundamental and applied nutrition in several mammalian species over two decades in the Kerala Veterinary College and Research Institute, Mannuthy, Trichur. He has published over 50 scientific papers, seven of which relate to the elephant. As project co-ordinator, he is presently engaged in determining the nutrient requirements for work elephants.

Irven O. Buss: Has conducted over 30 studies on African elephants, particularly in Uganda during the 60's and the early 70's. He has published many articles on reproductive anatomy, behavior; and management of the African elephant. He is currently continuing study on the function of the temporal gland of the African elephant.

John F. Eisenberg: Was the chief scientist for the Ceylon-Smithsonian Elephant Survey for four years (1967-1971). Since that time he has supervised two graduate dissertations carried out on elephants in Sri Lanka. He has written many papers on animal behavior, including papers on the ecology and behavior of the Asian elephant. He is currently the supervisory scientist for the Smithsonian-Venezuela Project, supervising a number of studies on the ecology and behavior of the mammals in that region.

Richard N. Racine: Was an elephant keeper and trainer at the Crandon Park Zoo, Key Biscayne, Florida. Although no longer active in elephant research, he hopes to return eventually to his interest in elephants by studying their behavior in the wild. He is currently working for a Ph.D. in ethology at Clark University, Worcester, Massachusetts.

Jeheskel Shoshani: Is researching the phylogenetic relationships within the Paenungulata (Proboscidea, Sirenia, Hyracoidea and Tubulidentata) and its relationship to other mammalian taxa. He has been studying the relationships within the family Elephantidae. He is author and co-author of several papers on related subjects. He initiated the establishment of the Elephant Interest Group in 1977 and is currently editor of its publication Elephant.

Kenneth C. Wylie: Is an historian on African and non-Western cultures. He has been studying the ivory trade in Africa, especially for the past four years. He has written a number of books and articles on ivory and related subjects. (His latest book: Ivory, Elephants and Man, will be published soon.) He is currently a free-lance writer specializing in animal and human relations.
